1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The College was established in 1984 to spread education in deprived area of Sangli District. Arts and Commerce College, Kadepur is a premier higher education Institution situated at Karad-Vita Road of Sangli District in Maharashtra.

Arts and Commerce College, Kadepur is belongs to Kadegaon tehsil which is a part of Sangli District. The tehsil is basically situated in drought-prone and rural areas. It is also a semi-arid region. Therefore, it receives few rainfalls in the monsoon season. Most of the population living around the Kadegaon is dependent on agriculture. Therefore, the neighborhood villages and local community naturally felt the need of the College imparting higher education for their future generations. The College Development Committee is consisted of well educated, socially responsible and humble human beings strongly determined and dedicated to the cause of social welfare. Therefore, The College is continuously working to cater the needs of higher education as well as to alleviate the socio-economic conditions of the larger area in which it is located.

The College from its beginning has been a key factor in bringing about transformation in the rural and drought-prone area through education, bearing in the mind the Motto of the Sanstha "Education for Knowledge, Science and Culture."

Our College has become a center of innovation in the field of higher education in Kadepur and its surrounding area. The College fulfills its mission under the guidance of President, Management, Principal, Teaching and Non-teaching staff and with proper representation of Students on various committees and activities. The College is recognized as a best College in rural area not only for academic performance but for cultural, sports and extension activities.

The College is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur having permanent affiliation. It is multi-faculty, co-education Institution having 06 departments of Arts and Commerce.

The College has its own beautiful premises and well-developed campus with all required infrastructure and modern amenities. The UGC has included the College in the list of the Colleges under Section 2(f) and 12(b) of the UGC Act,1956 in 2012 and accredited by NAAC at 'B' level with 2.13 CGPA in Second Cycle in 2013.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The College is permanently affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur and methodically follows the syllabi prescribed by the University for conventional B.A. and B.Com programs.
- The institution prepares its academic calendar in accordance with the academic calendar of University

and follows the syllabus prescribed by University.

- The curricula have been evolved in such a way to meet needs of time and equip learners with latest and practical knowledge of subjects.
- Implementation of the curriculum is planned through semester wise academic diary, teaching plan, academic calendar, academic and administrative meetings and conducting seminars, projects, fieldworks,, educational tours and industrial visits.
- Extra efforts are being taken to realize the application of subject knowledge through the Lead College Activities, guest lectures, workshops, projects thereby enabling enrichment of curriculum.
- At the beginning of every academic year teaching plan is prepared by the faculty and diary is maintained.
- Teaching staff has contributed in design and development of curriculum for in-house add-on, certificate and value added courses for holistic development of students. Teachers receive more freedom to design the most relevant curriculum to make the program employment-oriented considering the needs of the society.
- Departments prepare their own academic calendar/planner for completion of syllabus within stipulated time frame.
- Curriculum of affiliated University designed deals with cross cutting issues like gender, environment, human values, professional ethics etc. College has not only taken steps for imparting cross cutting issues in its classroom transactions, but also outside the classroom activities.
- For effective curriculum delivery, our College provides modern teaching aids like LCD projectors, laptops and computer lab. Well qualified teachers follow traditional as well as ICT based methods for teaching.
- College carried total 30 subject related certificate courses in last five years. During this period, 752 students have been enrolled and 735 students have completed their course.
- The Feedback mechanism of the institution is strong and diverse. Feedback on curriculum from all the stakeholders is obtained. Analyzing feedback as well as utilizing it for the purpose of improvement is done methodically. As a part of transparency, the College has taken initiative to upload on the institutional website the feedback analysis reports.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- Admission process is carried out as per the rules and regulations of affiliating University and Government by proper implementation of reservation policy.
- College faculty is highly qualified, committed and experienced total 20 teachers on full-time and temporary basis. Out of these 15 NET/SET/ and 07 Ph.D. holders and 03 are pursuing their Ph.D.
- Teacher-student ratio is 1:18
- To hone students as well-rounded individuals, classroom learning is complemented by experiential, participative and problem-solving based learning oriented towards critical thinking.
- Various student-centric teaching-learning methods and tools such as experiential learning through field projects, internship, survey method, role-playing etc. are conducted. Large number field visits, excursion tours, industrial visits, skill development programmes and special counseling and lecture sessions are conducted.
- More than 90% of teachers extensively use ICT enabled teaching-learning process for enhancing teaching-learning through e-resources, power point presentations, Dept. Blogs, PPT Bank, YouTube channels, screening of movies, Google classroom and Zoom etc. which has resulted into attainment of POs.
- IQAC has designed and implemented an evaluation mechanism for achievement of POs to ascertain

quality of teaching and learning process.

- Introduction of semester and CBCS pattern allow for CIE of students including unit tests, quiz, class assignments, open book, surprise tests, oral exams, research projects, seminars etc.
- The teachers provide a variety of learning experiences, including individual and collaborative learning i.e. Class seminars, oral, home assignments, projects, group discussion, mock teaching, various debate and elocution competitions, poster presentation, etc. are organized effectively to enrich teaching learning.
- Examination Committee resolves grievances related to examinations as per rules and regulations of University. Reforms are made to develop transparent and robust CIE system regarding frequency and variety for which well-planned academic calendar is followed strictly.
- The evaluation process of the College is fair, impartial, progressive, properly monitored and transparent.
- The College adopts method of communication of the POs, PSOs and COs to teachers and students.
- Average passing results for last five years is 92.90% for all programmes and in some courses 100%.
- Overall, our College believes in a holistic and inclusive pedagogy. The teaching-learning process of the institution is fair, interactive, experiential, cutting-edge and transparent.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The College has a Research Promotion Committee which monitors and coordinates all research activities on campus and to promote research.
- Organized workshop on several cutting-edge issues including entrepreneurship and research methodology as part of innovative practices. In addition to these, College has organized workshops on the themes related to environment, empowerment of women, media, water management, democracy, election and good governance, job opportunities etc.
- Faculty conducts interdisciplinary research work and outcomes are visible through number of publications in various peer reviewed journals.
- Since July 2017, total of a 43 papers of faculty members have been published in journals notified on the UGC list. During this period, teachers of the College published books and chapters in edited volumes, published books and papers in national international conference proceedings.
- College has received 78 of awards, recognition and appreciation for its extension activities through recognized bodies.
- College maintains practice to honors and felicitates members for their distinguished achievements in academic and social spheres.
- The College has active NSS unit. NSS unit organizes various extension activities by adopting village.
- NSS conducts wide range of extension activities to address issues of Gender, Environment, Save Girl Child, Water Conservation, Blood Donation, Special Camps. Tree Plantation, Cemetery Cleanliness, Voter's Day Celebration, Voter's Awareness Rally, Health Check-up camp, Rehabilitation of Flood Affected Village, etc.
- College shares its social responsibilities by organizing such extension activities neighboring areas and adopted villages.
- College observed different days of local, national and international importance like Independence Day, Gandhi Jayanti, Human Rights Day, International Women's Day, Girl Child Day, AIDS Day, World Environment Day, National Unity Day etc. to sensitize students and local community on different social issues.
- To inculcate holistic development of students, College makes available certain platforms like Save Girl Child Campaign, Anti-Superstitious programmes and AIDS Awareness rally. Such programmes sensitize students towards social issues like illiteracy, gender inequality and social disparity.

- We have functional MoU and Linkages with different disciplined institutes. College has organized number of activities as part of those MoU.
- Faculty Exchange Programme, Field Trip, Project Work, Research, Cultural Programme, Guest Lecture etc. were organized as part of these collaborations.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The College has adequate facilities with infrastructural and teaching learning resources. The total area of the College premises is 2.3 acres in which is built up area is 3543. Sq.mtr.
- The College has adequate physical facilities namely 14 classrooms, separate Principal cabin, office, library, IQAC room, seminar hall, ladies room, guest room, sports room, NSS room, ICT facility, staffroom along with separate cabins for every department.
- During the assessment period, more than 32.83 INR in lakhs spent on infrastructure augmentation.
- The Central Library of the Institute is rich learning resources having adequate facility.
- The College library contains 12417 books, 7946 text books, 4473 reference books, 3128 number of titles, 16 National and International Journals etc.
- Very recently the Library is partially automated through e-Granthalaya Integrated Library Management Software which is developed and maintained by National Information Center (NIC), Ministry of Electronic and Information Technology, Govt. of India.
- The Library has subscription of INFLIBNET NLIST for sharing e-resources.
- It subscribes 6000+ International/National e-journals and periodicals and it has 164300+ e-books.
- The Total expenditure on books and journals in the last five years is Rs.1.52 INR in Lakhs.
- Overall percentage of the usage of the Library by students and faculty members is 40.41% approximately per day.
- The Institution has enhanced its IT facilities to strengthen the teaching-learning processes and galaxy student Information system for administrative services.
- It ensures effective utilization of IT resources for the benefit of the students.
- One computer lab is equipped with adequate space for IT related tasks is allotted to every department.
- Total 16 computers with required configuration are made available by the institute for the academic and administrative purposes. All the computers are connected with LAN connectivity.
- Internet connection speed of 40 mbps is upgraded to 100 mbps to provide quick access. The campus is with Wi-Fi facility.
- All the software's are regularly updated.
- ICT resources have been sufficiently strengthened in the College and the computer-student ratio is 1:20.
- The Maintenance is carried out as per policy decision.
- Expenditure incurred on maintenance of academic and physical facilities during last five years is about Rs.19. 45 INR in Lakhs.

Student Support and Progression

- The College undertakes student focused academic and extra-curricular student support activities to provide them rich learning experience and thereby ensure students' progression to higher studies and gainful employment.

- Every department takes efforts for the innovative methods of continuous internal evaluation such as unit test, project works, surprise test, field work, survey, quiz competition, poetry recitation competition, class seminar, online tests, debate, group discussion, home assignments & open book tests are conducted by the concerned subject teachers.
- Regular departmental meetings play an important role in planning the curriculum delivery but also provide a platform to discuss the course contents, syllabus distribution, difficulties in delivering content, finalizing quality objectives and preparation of assessment methods.
- Teaching aids and ICT resources are used effectively during activities related to syllabus.
- Implementation of teaching plan is supervised periodically.
- The College has its own website on which curriculum is displayed.
- Central Library subscribes books, journals, e-journals, magazines and periodicals and maintains curriculum.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

- Evaluation is integral part of teaching-learning process.
- College follows rigorous mechanism for continuous monitoring and assessment of learning of the students. Taking into account the importance of continuous internal evaluation, the performance of

students is evaluated continuously by faculty in our Institution.

- Internal assessment process is conveyed to students in advance by conducting awareness programme regarding internal examination process, its time table, nature of question paper and evaluation as well as assessment to assure discipline and transparency.
- College internal evaluation system is decentralized in order to make it more transparent and objective.
- Internal evaluation process runs continuously throughout year and every department maintains record of internal examination. College takes lead for robust and transparency in internal examination.
- College conducts assignments, tests, presentations, group discussion, etc. to assess performance of students and exam committee executes its internal exams in meticulous manner. Unit tests and surprise-test answer sheets are shown to students on scheduled day after assessment.
- Grievances related to internal examination, students should submit application to committee.
- Committee takes review of grievances and gives suggestions to particular subject expert for solving complaint.
- Internal supervisors and internal flying squad are deputed for smooth conduction of exams.
- Committee discusses with concerned teacher and solves issue at primary level.
- Internal exam marks are displayed on notice board and queries are discussed with them.
- College and University have well-defined process for addressing evaluation grievances.
- Evaluation of first year is done at College and second and third years at University for University Exams. Grievances related at College level are solved by College Exam Committee and grievances related at University level are solved by University Exam Cell.
- Exam Cell collects applications and fees of answer books for photocopy. Photocopy is given to students. Student can apply photocopy within fifteen days after declaration of result.
- After receiving photo copy, students should consult subject experts.
- If there is possibility of change in marks then they can apply for reevaluation.
- Examination Department reassesses answer book by another subject expert.
- If there is any change in marks, it is to be corrected.

- Generally there is zero tolerance policy for malpractices of students.
- Internal assessment is carried out in class in jovial way by asking questions.
- Students have freedom to use suggestion box for queries and instructions.
- Students go through answer books and know performance regarding strength and lacunas.
- If any queries, exam committee organizes meetings with students to clarify doubts and queries.
- Evaluation and communication process system creates faithful relationship between student and teacher.
- All Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time bound and efficient.

The College has adequate facilities with infrastructural and teaching learning resources. The total area of the College premises is 2.3 acres in which is built up area is 3543. sq.mtr.

The infrastructure facilities and resources are classified as follows:

Classrooms:

- The Institution has 14 classrooms for all classes, of which most of the classrooms are ICT enabled. The facilities such as green boards, proper light, ventilation, chairs, tables, dais, duster, fan, LED bulbs etc. are provided for effective teaching and learning.
- All teaching classrooms are well equipped along with all amenities.

Administrative Office:

- Separate Principal cabin with adequate facilities.
- Well-furnished administrative office with required facilities.
- Staffroom for teachers with adequate facilities
- Separate store-room avail for office
- In accordance with guidelines of Shivaji University, Kolhapur, College has established strong room for University examination with Xerox Machine, Computer, Printer, CCTV surveillance and Internet connectivity.
- Separate Generator and Battery Backup with inverter unit.

Library:

- The Central Library of the Institution is a spacious and well-furnished unit.
- Library is equipped with compactor book rack having 14000+ books storage capacity.
- There is a separate seating arrangement for students and faculty members.
- There is separate Reference Section, Display Section, Internet Section, Journal Section and Newspaper Reading Section in the library.

ICT Facilities:

- The Institution has made considerable growth in providing ICT facilities.
- All the departments are equipped with computers, speakers and 100 mbps Wi-Fi internet connection. In addition, there is one seminar hall equipped along with LCD Projector with all

required facilities.

- One computer lab with 06 computers used for practicals and some courses.
- The administrative office is equipped with computers, printers, scanners and Xerox machine for its efficient functioning.
- Separate ICT equipped IQAC room; computer and internet connectivity, color printer and high speed scanner are available.
- The entire campus has Wi-Fi access facility and it is under CCTV surveillance.

Cultural:

- A spacious hall is available for cultural activities and there are students also prepare and practice during competitions.
- Students have represented at District, University and State level cultural events.
- College has essentially equipped Cultural Cell for students who have genuine interest in artistic activities.
- Cultural cell is fully equipped with instruments such as, Tabla, Flute, Harmonium, Dholaki, etc. and musical accessories audio-visual aids including Sound System with speaker, L.C.D. projector and Computers are available.

Sports and Yoga:

- College has playground and Gymkhana keeping in view overall personality development of students.
- The Department of Physical Education and Sports has a separate unit with sports equipment for outdoor and indoor sports.
- The Gymnasium with adequate equipment's is made available for students.
- The Institution has its own separate playground for outdoor games.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection

- The Institution has enhanced its IT facilities to strengthen the teaching-learning processes and administrative services. Effective utilization of IT facilities is ensured by the Institute from time to time.
- Administrative office is fully equipped with computers having latest configuration and software.
- Adequate printers, scanners, xerox machines are made available to meet the needs of the users.
- Updating of ICT facilities helped in efficient functioning of Administrative Office.
- Special subject departments are provided with computers, LCD projectors, speakers, screens to promote the use of IT in classroom teaching. - IQAC room is also equipped with ICT facilities such as 1 computer, 1 scanner, 1 printers and with 100 mbps Internet connection.
- The College library is also well equipped with ICT facilities. Library software is changed to upgraded version to enhance the services of the library. The Computer Usage center with internet connection is made available to the students and the faculty members in the library.
- Apart from these, the CCTV surveillance is installed with 14 cameras to maintain the discipline and security in the College premises.

Response:

Best Practice–I

Title: Cleanliness Campaign in Kadepur Cemetery

Objectives:

- To keep cemetery clean for seating and standing of people
- To create awareness among native people about environmental issues
- To make aware the people and volunteers about the significance of cleanliness of the cemetery
- To inculcate the value of cleanliness among the volunteers
- To impart the value of charity among the volunteers

The Context:

People pay tribute to the martyrs at the cemetery. When they notice the uncleanliness there, negative impression about the cemetery and the village is created in the minds of our visitors and relatives. The cemetery is located in Kadepur. The area of the cemetery comes under the open land where garbage is being dumped by the people living around it. Most of the times the cemeteries in the villages are unclean and people gather, stand and sit there in a very dirty place for cremation. There is the presence of stray dogs, prey birds and cattle. People offer eatables to the soul of the departed. As result the place becomes dirty. Often regarded with caution and unease, burial grounds and funeral sites have mostly been sidelined into the fringes of society. These places are crucial to the proper functioning of any community but their importance has long been overlooked.

The College came to know the severity of the problem, and thought that the awareness needs to be created among the people. He called the meeting with the Kadepur Grampanchayat authorities in this regard and it was decided to start cleanliness campaign in the Kadepur cemetery. NSS programme officers and other staff-members agreed with the decision.

Departed souls need to be respected. At least we should have clean and well-regulated crematoriums. Cleanliness is the art of keeping your intellect, body, home, and environment spotless.

The Practice:

After the beginning of the campaign in the Kadepur cemetery, it was decided to clean the place twice in a Year. So the NSS programme officers with the staff and volunteers use to go there and clean the place. Volunteers clean the place by using broomsticks, spades, and other devices like cutters. Burning of bodies with wood at the crematoriums saying it results in rise in emission of carbon dioxide. The place became clean and the villagers of Kadepur started to feel the difference between the previous situation and after the cleanliness. The practice is going on for the last Five years.

Evidence of Success:

Ever since the decision was taken, there has been no compromise in the cleanliness. The people of Kadepur came to know the importance of the practice and they appreciated the practice. They admitted that they never thought of it before. This practice made them aware that the cemeteries must be clean like our houses. Even the people from outstations who use to come for the ritual there, they use to appreciate the practice and give their complimentary remarks on the cleanliness of the cemetery. They give their feedback on the written paper and it is the achievement of the College

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

It was a terrible sight as clothes and shoes were thrown here and there. When this practice was started, the volunteers that is students were afraid of going in the cemetery especially girl students. But in the course of

time they became courageous enough to go there freely and do the cleanliness campaign.

Best Practice -II

Title: Service-learning through Blood Donation

Objective:

The objective of the practice is to engage community to create closer ties between institution of higher education and communities they serve with the result to deepen the quality of learning and discovery and to develop humanitarian approach.

The Context:

The community-based learning combines traditional classroom instruction with community-service to enhance the learning of the students and civic participation. The college's focus for community improvement and engagement connects academic program with community service so that students, faculty and community partners can forge linkage between theory and practice, between knowledge and action and between the resources of institution and the community development.

The Practice:

The College organizes yearly blood donation camp. During the last three years, the college has collected blood in collaboration with Government Medical and Hospital Miraj. The Institution aims at ensuring easy accessibility and adequate supply of safe and quality blood and blood components collected from voluntary blood donors to those in need. The blood is stored and transported under optimum conditions with the help of the Raktpedi. Transfusion is always under the supervision of trained personnel. Under the policy, blood transfusion is available to people irrespective of their economic or social status. Total Quality Management approach has ensured in smooth conduct of Blood Donation Camps and follow up work.

Evidence of Success:

Successfully implemented blood donation practice, the Institution has collected hundreds of blood bags in blood donation camps it brought awareness about humanity in the community and it raised the importance of blood donation to save lives.

Problems Encountered:

Obstacles faced include: inadequacy of resources. The practice has made an impact on community, students, and teachers. Donated blood is being utilized by people and institutions not only in Kadepur but also in district and state level. The blood is also being utilized by the patients suffering from thalassemia, AIDS and Hemophilia, etc. The voluntary blood donation camps have resulted in great impact on the students as well as teachers. The impact is also apparent on personality development, moral education and on civic responsibility and is reflected in reduced indiscipline and enhanced sense of the responsibility among the students towards the college. It has also created a sense of managerial ability among the students for organizing such type of events in the college.

Resources Required:

For collecting bloods hospital mobile van is required. Efforts are also made to make the blood transfusion services viable through non-profit recovery system.
